#### **Onondaga Lake History**

Pollution from growing city and expanding industries

**1940s:** Lake was declared unsafe for swimming

**1970s:** Fishing was prohibited

**1994:** Listed as a Superfund site, due to mercury contamination of Lake's bottom





## Onondaga Lake Cleanup



About 2.2 million cubic yards of material was removed



Approximately
475 acres of the
Lake has been
capped to provide
a new habitat
layer, prevent
erosion, and
isolate remaining
contaminants



More than 1.1 million plants, trees, and shrubs are being planted, and 90 acres of wetlands enhanced





Restoration and Stewardship:
Onondaga Lake Important Bird Area

Critical habitat for wintering waterfowl and bald eagles along the Atlantic flyway

- 783 volunteers have donated their time at various events
- 19 events have been offered for the public to attend
- Each event has been to attended to capacity
- Volunteers come back to attend different types of events

- All events are staffed with scientists and specialists from the restoration projects
- A birding survey is always a part of every event
- An online curriculum is available for all educators\*
- Students participate in hands-on activities and wetlands tours during field trips to Visitor Center\*






### **OLCC's Sustainability**
